One day a six year old girl and her Nanna go to see the outdoor Manger scene at church. Since they are also going out for a breakfast treat grandma says, 'Do you think we should bring the Baby Jesus some pancakes?'

'No Nanna,' the little girl replies. 'I like the pancakes.'

'Well how about some eggs or toast?'

'No Nanna, I like the eggs and toast.'

'Well how about some oatmeal?'

'Oh that's okay Nanna, he can have ALL the oatmeal... I don't like it anyway.'

We tend to view children as cute in their honesty. We are sometimes tolerant of teens who are less cute in their need to express what they like and what they don't like. We often find adults insufferable when they insist on announcing their likes and dislikes. Holiness, is rarely neat and tidy or predictable, and doesn't completely eliminate the human trait to have likes and dislikes, or selfishness.

Family is a place in which we unconsciously assume the likes and dislikes of our parents and other siblings. These likes and dislikes can be helpful. They provide us with a personality. They can also - especially when they are unconsciously influencing us - make us self-centered, or ego-driven. No matter how we look at it, families (like holiness) are messy.

Unfortunately, immature religion and spirituality refuse to see the messiness. They demand and require purity, which is another name for perfection. Yet, both Luke and Matthew create scenarios that show us that holiness is rarely neat and tidy or predictable; that the birth of Jesus (the Incarnation)

is messy; that the Christian way of life is messy... AND God is in the middle of the mess.

Mary is unexpectedly and inexplicably found to be pregnant; she and Joseph hastily marry; the birth of Jesus takes place in a dirty and smelly stable; they are visited by uncouth and unwashed and impure shepherds; they have to escape at night and flee to Egypt like refugees to avoid certain death; they are compelled to make the offering of the poor when Jesus is circumcised; they are promised that their hearts will be broken because of the sufferings of their child; and their child is lost.

Yes, family, relationships, holiness are all messy, and rarely what we expect them to be... AND God is with us in the mess. This is the message of the cross. This is the good news that Jesus proclaims to us.
